States that the formula shall be student based, so that each student entering or leaving shall impact funding. States that each LEA shall receive at least 25% of the nonclassroom components. Requires any funding generated through the BEP for instructional salaries and wages to be spent on instructional salaries and wages, however for LEAs where the average salary exceeds the statewide average salary, such funds may be used on instructional benefits. Creates a mechanism for reduction of the sentence imposed on such a defendant. Prohibits the imposition of a sentence of imprisonment for life without possibility of parole upon any person convicted of crimes otherwise punishable by imprisonment for life without possibility of parole who at the time of the commission of the crimes was less than 18 years of age. As to such a person, the maximum punishment that may be imposed is imprisonment for life with the possibility of parole. Specifies the mitigating circumstances the court must consider when determining a sentence. Authorizes a court to reduce any term of imprisonment imposed upon a defendant convicted as an adult for crimes committed prior to the defendant's 18th birthday to time served or any other sentence the court feels appropriate so long as it is less than the sentence originally imposed. Provides that the court may impose a reduced sentence even if the new sentence departs from the statutory minimum sentence for the original charges, if: (1) The defendant has served 15 calendar years in prison for offenses of which the defendant was convicted as an adult and that were committed and completed prior to the defendant's 18th birthday; and (2) The court finds, after considering the factors set forth below, that the defendant does not pose an unreasonable risk of danger to the safety of any person or the community and that the interests of justice warrant a sentence modification. A court will entertain subsequent petitions pursuant to this bill, but no sooner than five years following the date that the order on the previous petition becomes final. If a sentence has not been reduced after a third petition, a court will entertain a fourth and final petition pursuant to this bill, no sooner than five years following the date that the order on the third petition becomes final. No court will entertain a fifth or successive petition. Requires the department of correction to provide written notice of this bill and its procedures to any defendant who has served 14 calendar years in prison for crimes for which the defendant was convicted as an adult and that were committed and completed prior to the defendant's 18th birthday. The department must simultaneously provide notice to the district attorney general and public defender in the jurisdiction in which the sentence was imposed. Details the procedures for a defendant to file a petition for a sentence reduction under this bill. Provides that any victim of the crime for which the defendant is imprisoned or a family member of the victim if the victim is deceased, will retain all rights provided by law, including the right to participate in the hearing by oral or written statement. The victim will be given the option of participating in the hearing by video conference if available in the jurisdiction. The district attorney general must provide the victim with a copy of the defendant's petition prior to the hearing at the victim's request. If the court reduces the defendant's sentence to a term of imprisonment that remains to be served, present sentencing laws will govern the defendant's eligibility for release on parole from the new sentence imposed. Provides that this bill will have retroactive application and any inmate who has served more than 15 calendar years in prison for crimes committed before the inmate reached his or her 18th birthday may file a petition in accordance with this bill, including those serving sentences of imprisonment for life without the possibility of parole or imprisonment for life with the possibility of parole.

Amendment: Senate Judiciary Committee amendment 1 (015231) deletes all language after the enacting clause and rewrites the bill to (1) increase, from \$25,000 to \$100,000, the death benefit for a law enforcement officer who is killed in the line of duty, and (2) authorize the TBI's investigative report to be disclosed to the public by the district attorney general upon agreement with the chief law enforcement officer of each agency involved in the shooting. HOUSE CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE AMENDMENT 1 (015675) increases the amount of compensation for the death of law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty from \$25,000 to \$100,000. Adds that after completion of an investigation by the TBI into an officer-involved shooting death and after the completion of the prosecutorial function by the district attorney general, the investigative record shall become a public record. Provides that "officer-involved shooting death," for the purposes of this section, means a death that results from an officer-involved shooting when the shooting occurs while the law enforcement officer is on-duty or is off-duty while performing activities that are within the scope of the law enforcement officer's duties. SENATE FINANCE COMMITTEE AMENDMENT 1 (015920) authorizes the TBI's investigative report to be disclosed to the public by the district attorney general and to require all records released under the bill as amended to be released in accordance with Title 10, Chapter 7, Part 5.
Fiscal Note: (Dated February 11, 2016) Increase State Expenditures – \$300,000/Death Benefit Fund
21. HB2102
G. Hardaway (D) **CRIMINAL LAW : Expunction of records - cases of mistaken identity.** Directs a chief of police, sheriff, or district attorney general to petition the court with criminal jurisdiction over an act for the expunction of records relating to any arrest, charge, or indictment based on mistaken identity; requires the court to order expunction of the records without cost to the person. Defines a person who is "mistaken identity" as a person who has been arrested, charged, or indicted for a criminal act and a subsequent investigation has revealed that the person arrested was not the individual the arresting officer believed the person to be.
SB2279 - S. Kyle (D) - 04/19/16 - Senate passed.
Amendment: House Amendment 1 (014720) authorizes any person seeking expunction under T.C.A. 40-32-101(a)(1)(A) to have the expunction expedited if the person was arrested or charged due to mistaken identity, the person provides evidence of the relevant circumstances and the person requests the court to order the expunction to be expedited. Requires the TBI to expedite the destruction of the person's records if the court orders the expunction to be expedited. Defines "mistaken identity" for purposes of expedited expunctions.
Fiscal Note: (Dated February 11, 2016) NOT SIGNIFICANT
22. HB2482
R. Akbari (D) **CRIMINAL LAW : Trial court may order sentences to run concurrently.** Allows a trial court to order sentences for two offenses to run concurrently when one of the offense was committed while the defendant was released on bail for the other offense, if the order is based on a good faith plea agreement. Broadly captioned.
SB2398 - D. Overbey (R) - 03/30/16 - Taken off notice in Senate Judiciary Committee.
23. HB2310
A. Parkinson (D) **LOCAL GOVERNMENT : Municipalities may decriminalize possession of marijuana.** Authorizes a metropolitan government or a municipality that maintains a local law enforcement entity to place a referendum on the ballot in the regular August election, any November election, or any regularly scheduled election a question related to the decriminalization of possession of one ounce of marijuana or less.
SB2321 - S. Kyle (D) - 04/12/16 - Failed in Senate Judiciary Committee 3-6 after adopting amendments 1 and 2.
Amendment: Senate Judiciary Committee Amendment 1, House Criminal Justice Committee Amendment 1 (015287) clarifies that the question put to the voters should concern the voter's preference for the exercise of police power. Proposes the question asking whether local law enforcement should reprioritize enforcement of possession of one ounce or less of marijuana by an adult for personal use so that such adults are provided a citation in lieu of arrest. Requires the governing body, upon passing the authorizing resolution, to notify the county election commission and submit a copy of the resolution at least 60 days before the scheduled election. Provides that the results of the question are advisory only and shall not impair the enforcement of general law or alter the policies and procedures of any law enforcement agency. SENATE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE AMENDMENT 2 clarifies that in the question put to voters concerns only adults currently eligible under law to possess marijuana, and those adults are the ones that may be provided a citation in lieu of arrest.

M. Stewart (D) **CRIMINAL LAW : Increases penalties for assault against correctional officers.** Increases the penalty for assault and aggravated assault committed against correctional officers, guards, jailers, or other employees of a penal institution to a Class E felony. Requires the department of correction to provide a report each month detailing the number of assaults in each correctional institution. Requires the report to include training plans that will be implemented to decrease the number of assaults.
SB2424 - J. Yarbro (D) - 04/11/16 - Senate passed with amendment 1.
Amendment: Senate Amendment 1 (014901) rewrites the bill to (1) remove the felony enhancement for assaults committed against a law enforcement officer, correctional officer, guard, jailer, or other full time employee of a penal institution, local jail, or workhouse, or a

healthcare provider acting in the discharge of the provider's duty, (2) remove the required monthly reporting by the DOC to the General Assembly regarding the number of assaults occurring in each correctional facility during the preceding month, and (3) adds a requirement that the DOC report any conduct by an inmate that constitutes assault under Tenn. Code Ann. 39-13-101(a)(1) to the appropriate district attorney general for prosecution.

Fiscal Note: (Dated February 28, 2016) Increase State Expenditures – \$3,782,000/Incarceration*

M. Stewart (D) **CRIMINAL LAW : Life imprisonment - eligibility for release.** Permits a defendant sentenced to life imprisonment to become eligible for release after service of 60 percent of 60 years, but requires 25 years to be served before sentence credits are accepted. Requires the department of correction to notify an inmate that he or she qualifies for early release, and permits the inmate to submit a written request. Provides that early release does not apply to those sentenced to death or life imprisonment without parole.
SB2413 - J. Yarbro (D) - 03/29/16 - Senate Judiciary Committee deferred to Summer Study.
Fiscal Note: (Dated February 28, 2016) Decrease State Expenditures – \$1,484,300/Incarceration*/FY21-22 and Subsequent Years
26. HB561
S. Jones (D) **HEALTH CARE : Medical Cannabis Access Act.** Creates the Medical Cannabis Access Act. Establishes a program for patients with chronic or debilitating medical conditions to receive medical marijuana for their treatment. Specifies qualifying medical conditions include cancer; glaucoma; multiple sclerosis; human immunodeficiency virus; acquired immune deficiency syndrome; Hepatitis C; amyotrophic lateral sclerosis; Crohn's disease; post-traumatic stress disorder; Alzheimer's disease; and any other condition approved by the health department. Specifies that such patients must be enrolled in the Safe Access program and certified to receive the medical marijuana by the patient's practitioner. Requires qualifying patients receive a practitioner's finding that the potential benefits for medical cannabis would likely outweigh the health risks for that patient. Allows a pharmacy or regulated dispensary to issue the medical marijuana. Establishes a medical cannabis advisory committee, which shall be responsible for making recommendations to the general assembly regarding the use of medical cannabis in the state. (29 pp.)
SB660 - S. Kyle (D) - 02/12/15 - Introduced in the Senate.

Camper (D) **CRIMINAL LAW : Destruction of public records related to expunction.** Clarifies when certain expunction orders are granted that the petitioner is entitled to have all public records of the expunged arrest warrant, citation, indictment, presentment, information, or conviction destroyed in the manner set forth by law. This bill further clarifies that such an expunction restores the petitioner to the same status occupied before the arrest, indictment, presentment, information, trial, or conviction. Specifies that a petitioner who has been granted an expunction order under any one of the above provisions is not guilty of perjury, or giving a false statement, when failing to recite or acknowledge the expunged arrest, indictment, presentment, information, trial, or conviction in response to any inquiry made of the petitioner for any purpose. This bill further specifies that the petitioner who has been granted an expunction order who is otherwise eligible to possess a firearm under state and federal law will be eligible to purchase a firearm and apply for and be granted a carry permit. Under present law, a petitioner for expunction must pay to the clerk of the court a fee of \$350 upon filing of the petition. This bill adds that the fee for filing a petition for expunction of multiple convictions of felonies and misdemeanors committed prior to November 1, 1989, which meet certain criteria, is also \$350.
SB2156 - R. Tate (D) - 03/29/16 - Taken off notice in Senate Judiciary Committee.
Amendment: House Criminal Justice Committee Amendment 1 (013750) removes T.C.A. 40-32-101(g), which required the District Public Defender in each judicial district to annually conduct at least one educational program providing information and assistance with the expunction process. Removes the provision in T.C.A. 40-32-101(g)(12), which required moneys in the public defenders expunction fund to be used to defray the expense of the educational program.

P. Marsh (R) **TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES : Overweight loads that are permitted and nondivisible.** Removes restriction that permitted nondivisible overweight loads less than 150,000 pounds that are carried by truck tractor and semi-trailer combinations not exceed 50 feet in length.
SB1964 - J. Tracy (R) - 04/18/16 - Senate passed.
Amendment: HOUSE AMENDMENT 2 (014972) deletes all language of the original bill. Authorizes TDOT to issue special permits allowing axle widths in excess of the axle weight limits for non-divisible overweight loads exceeding the maximum gross vehicle weight of 150,000 pounds. Prohibits the maximum width of a vehicle including the truck and semi-trailer or trailer combination from exceeding 10 feet instead of 8 feet 6 inches, provided that the load may exceed 10 feet in width if permitted. Deletes that a truck tractor or semi-trailer or trailer combinations shall not exceed 50 feet in length from the point of attachment to the tractor. Requires TDOT to evaluate the capacity of bridges or similar structures to carry the proposed movement of an overweight or overdimensional load along a particular route and requires the department to charge the requestor for the proposed evaluation each time a different route is proposed for: movements weighing over 165,000 pounds, but no more than 250,000 pounds instead of 200,000 and 300,000 pounds, a \$100 fee; movements weighing over 250,000 pounds instead of 300,000 pounds, but no more than 500,000 pounds, a \$300 fee; and movements weighing over 500,000 pounds are charged actual cost, instead of a \$500 fee for movements weighing over 500,000 pounds but no more than 1,000,000 pounds. The fee for movements weighing over 1,000,000 pounds remains the actual cost. Requires TDOT to collect an \$100 permit fee on an annual basis for each specific vehicle to be used for transporting overdimensional or overweight loads or both, except for vehicles specifically permitted and used to transport cotton seed modules, overdimensional noncommercial boats, and mobile homes for vehicles transporting loads not exceeding 13 feet 10 inches in height, 90 feet in length, or 12 feet 6 inches in width. The current fee for such vehicles is \$500. Authorizes vehicles transporting loads not exceeding 13 feet 6 inches in width to obtain an annual permit and requires an escort vehicle. Requires an annual permit fee of \$750 for vehicles transporting loads not exceeding 100,000 pounds, and a \$1,500 permit fee for vehicles transporting loads exceeding 100,000 pounds,

but not exceeding 120,000 pounds. The current annual permit fees are \$500 for vehicles transporting loads of up to 120,000 pounds, and \$1,000 for weights in excess of 120,000 pounds. Requires a \$2,250 permit fee for vehicles transporting loads exceeding 120,000 pounds, but not exceeding 140,000 pounds. Requires a \$3,000 permit fee for vehicles transporting loads exceeding 140,000 pounds, but not exceeding 155,000 pounds. Requires a \$3,500 permit fee for vehicles transporting loads exceeding 155,000 pounds, but not exceeding 165,000 pounds. Requires a separate permit fee for vehicles transporting loads that are both overdimensional and overweight loads. Prohibits annual permits for any vehicle transporting loads with weights exceeding 165,000 pounds or dimensions exceeding 13 feet 10 inches in height, 90 feet in length, or 13 feet 6 inches in width and requires such vehicles to obtain a special permit. Prohibits vehicle movement from exceeding any vehicle weight limits posted on any bridge or highway as set by jurisdiction. Requires the Act to be effective January 1, 2017.

A. Swann (R)

TRANSPORTATION GENERAL : **Middle east conflicts added to earmarked license plates.** Adds the Global War on Terrorism and the Afghanistan War to the list of specialty license plates created for honorably discharged veterans. Requires the plates to be designed by the commissioner of veterans services in consultation with the commissioner of revenue. Specifies that for honorably discharged veterans who served during the Global War on Terrorism or Afghanistan War but who do not qualify for issuance of the plates, that the American flag shall be in the center of the license plate and the strip along the bottom of the license plate shall read "Global War on Terrorism Era Veteran" or "Afghanistan War Era Veteran". Specifies that one registration plate may be issued free of charge to any qualified applicant provided that one additional plate may be obtained by any eligible person upon payment of the regular registration fee for plates, and payment of one-half of the fee equal to the cost of actually designing and manufacturing the plates. Additional registration plates may be obtained by any qualified applicant upon payment of the regular license fee for plates, plus the payment of the fee equal to the cost of actually designing and manufacturing the plates.

SB2207 - D. Overbey (R) - 04/18/16 - Taken off notice in Senate Finance, Ways & Means Committee.

Amendment: SENATE TRANSPORTATION & SAFETY COMMITTEE AMENDMENT 1 (013646) substitutes the name of the plate for honorably discharged veterans of Operation Freedom's Sentinel and Operation Freedom's Sentinel Era Veteran to a plate for honorably discharged veterans of Afghanistan War and Afghanistan War Era Veteran in subdivision 13 of Section 1 in the original bill. SENATE TRANSPORTATION & SAFETY COMMITTEE AMENDMENT 2, HOUSE TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE AMENDMENT 1 (013952) deletes Section 2 of the original bill and revises the fee schedule for all honorably discharged veteran license plates by authorizing the issuance of one registration plate to any qualified applicant upon payment of one-half of the regular registration fee under Tenn. Code Ann. § 55-4-111 plus payment of one-half of the fee provided for in Tenn. Code Ann. § 55-4-203(c)(1) for combat veterans who served in Vietnam, World War II, Korea, Operation Desert Storm, Bosnia, Operation Enduring Freedom, and the Global War on Terrorism.

Fiscal Note: (Dated March 7, 2016) Increase State Expenditures - \$1,015,000/FY16-17/Department of Revenue Decrease State Revenue – \$5,524,300/Highway Fund/FY16-17 \$112,700/General Fund/FY16-17 \$5,526,800/Highway Fund/FY17-18 and Subsequent Years \$112,800/General Fund/FY17-18 and Subsequent Years General
3. HB2376
A. Holt (R)

CRIMINAL LAW : **Private institutions may use drones.** Specifies that it is lawful for a person acting on behalf of either a public or a private institution of higher education to capture an image using an unmanned aircraft in this state for purposes of research. Current law only applies to public institutions of higher education.

SB2470 - J. Stevens (R) - 04/11/16 - Senate passed.

Amendment: House Amendment 1 (012785) adds that the capture of an image with an unmanned aircraft for the practice of land surveying is lawful. Provides that the capture of an image by TDOT is lawful so long as the image is used for maintenance, planning, etc. purposes. Amends T.C.A. 39-13-902(b) to say that state or local law enforcement agencies, instead of state or local government agencies, may only use their captured images for their intended purpose. HOUSE AMENDMENT 2 (014676) adds a section to the bill as amended broadening Tenn. Code Ann. § 39-13-902 to apply to certified photogrammetrists using unmanned aircrafts for photogrammetric mapping.

M. Carter (R)

TRANSPORTATION GENERAL : **Gas tax revenues to not be used for non-vehicular purposes.** Restricts the use of state gasoline tax revenues distributed to the highway fund, counties, and cities to the construction, improvement, and maintenance of highways and bridges. Prohibits the use of such revenue for pedestrian, bicycle, and other non-vehicular facilities.

SB1716 - T. Gardenhire (R) - 04/19/16 - Taken off notice in Senate Finance, Ways & Means Committee.

Amendment: Senate Finance, Ways & Means Committee Amendment 1, House Transportation Committee Amendment 1 (013220) deletes all language except for the effective date clause. Prohibits gasoline tax revenue distributed to the Highway Fund, counties, and cities from being used for the construction, improvement, or maintenance of pedestrian and bicycle trails and paths, parks, greenways, and similar facilities open to the use of the public for non-vehicular travel, and for public roads with a posted speed limit greater than 35 miles per hour. Such prohibition does not apply to the construction, improvement, or maintenance of sidewalks. For new or reconstructed roads with a proposed posted speed limit of 35 miles per hour or less, prohibits such revenue from being used for the construction of a new dedicated bicycle lane unless the work is part of the larger highway improvement project and the bicycle lane serves a transportation purpose supported by an engineering analysis. Establishes that this bill as amended does not prohibit the state, a county, or a city from receiving or using federal funds for the construction, improvement, maintenance, or operation of nonvehicular facilities, or from using gasoline tax revenue to match any federal-aid funding for such facilities. Further establishes that this bill as amended does not prohibit such entities from using gasoline tax revenue to maintain existing bicycle lanes or to accommodate bicycles in existing bike lanes or on shoulders or via shared lanes, and it does not prohibit the Department of Environment and Conservation from using funds that may be derived through grants from the Department of Transportation or federal programs for recreational trails in state parks. HOUSE FINANCE, WAYS & MEANS COMMITTEE AMENDMENT 1 (015007) adds language to the bill as amended by amendment 013220 to establish that nothing in this Act shall preclude the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency from using gasoline tax funds distributed to the Wildlife Resources Fund pursuant to T.C.A. 67-3-901(g) for purposes authorized pursuant to the Tennessee Boating Safety Act of 1965.

Fiscal Note: (Dated January 26, 2016) Other Fiscal Impact – According to the Department of Transportation, this bill would result in a violation of the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Rehabilitation Act and would jeopardize federal funding from the Federal Highway Administration. The Department anticipates receiving \$874,863,555 in FY16-17 and \$893,770,525 in FY17-18. Further, the bill could result in a decrease in federal funding available to municipalities. The extent and timing of any such decreases cannot be determined with reasonable certainty.

B. Beck (D)

TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES : **Increases distance for half-ton trucks approaching truck alike.** Increases from 300 to 350 feet the distance required for a truck of more than one and a half tons to approach any similarly large trucks proceeding in the same direction on a highway, except in overtaking and passing or unless one or both trucks are stopped or disabled.

SB2425 - J. Yarbro (D) - 03/24/16 - Senate passed with amendments 1 and 2.

Amendment: SENATE AMENDMENT 1 (013275) deletes all language of the original bill. Removes the \$250 fine specification from the Class B misdemeanor, and the \$500 fine specification from the Class A misdemeanor, relative to failure to yield right of way offenses when such offenses result in serious bodily injury, or death to another person, respectively. SENATE AMENDMENT 2 (013743) states this act shall be known and may be cited as the "Elena Zamora Memorial Act"..
Fiscal Note: (Dated March 3, 2016) NOT SIGNIFICANT

- TRANSPORTATION GENERAL : **List of TN historic sites published on TDOT website.** Authorizes the department of transportation to publish a directory of signs denoting Tennessee-owned historic sites on the department's website. Broadly captioned.
SB2126 - P. Bailey (R) - 04/13/16 - Senate Finance, Ways & Means Committee deferred to the next calendar.
Amendment: Senate Transportation and Safety Committee amendment 1, House Transportation Committee amendment 1 (012999) deletes all language of the original bill. Requires the Department of Transportation (TDOT) to award any contract for administration of special service signs to the vendor whose proposal offers the least cost to the retail user of the signs, rather than the best value for the state. Requires all administrative contracts to be awarded on an objective and competitive basis pursuant to the Department of Transportation (TDOT) promulgating the rules for such action.
Fiscal Note: (Dated February 2, 2016) NOT SIGNIFICANT
7. HB1525
J. Matlock (R)
- PUBLIC FINANCE : **Allows public funding only under certain conditions for an MPO.** Allows state funds for metropolitan transportation planning to be released to, or spent by, a metropolitan planning organization (MPO) only if the MPO's policy board ensures that (1) the number of votes for any local government official is equally weighted, and (2) one voting member residing within the MPO's boundaries is chosen by the Tennessee County Highway Officials Association.
SB1467 - R. McNally (R) - 04/19/16 - Taken off notice in Senate Finance, Ways & Means Committee.
Amendment: House Transportation Committee Amendment 1 (013300) deletes and rewrites the bill such that the only substantive change is to clarify that in the event any provision of this legislation is deemed inconsistent with the requirements of 23 U.S.C. § 134, then the federal law shall control. SENATE FINANCE COMMITTEE AMENDMENT 1 (015206) deletes and rewrites the bill such that the substantive changes are: (1) to declare any action taken on or after May 18, 2015, by a metropolitan planning organization while out of compliance with the requirements of Tenn.Code Ann. § 64-8-301, is void and has no effect until the policy board meets the requirements; and (2) to clarify that in the event any provision of this legislation is deemed inconsistent with the requirements of 23 U.S.C. § 134, then the federal law shall control.
Fiscal Note: (Dated February 25, 2016) Other Fiscal Impact – To the extent the policy board of the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) perpetually fails, or is delayed, in complying with the requirements of Tenn. Code Ann. § 64-8-301, the MPO could lose, or be delayed in receiving, approximately \$1,489,600 in grant funding. To the extent the board is in compliance, or becomes compliant, the impact of this bill is considered not significant. Additionally, the provisions of the bill could place the state out of compliance with Title 23 of the U.S. Code § 134 (Metropolitan Transportation Planning) which explicitly requires state departments of transportation to distribute metropolitan planning funds provided by the Federal Highway Trust Fund to metropolitan planning organizations to conduct transportation planning activities. Non-compliance could potentially lead to additional unknown reductions of federal funding to state and local government provided from the Federal Highway Trust Fund.

- TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES : **Requirement for children being secured in forward-facing position.** Removes requirement that any child age one through three weighing more than 20 pounds be secured in a forward facing position while traveling in a child safety seat.
HB1468 - J. Clemmons (D) - 03/22/16 - House Transportation Committee deferred to summer study after adopting amendment 1.
Amendment: Senate amendment 1, House Transportation Committee amendment 1 (011954) deletes all language after the enacting clause. Requires any child under two years of age to be properly secured in a rear facing child passenger restraint system in the rear seat, granted a rear seat is available. Requires any child two to four years of age, or a child under five years of age, whose height or weight equals or exceeds the limits allowed by the instructions on the rear-facing restraint system, to be properly secured in a front facing child passenger restraint system in the rear seat, granted a rear seat is available. Requires any child five to twelve years of age, over 40 pounds and under 4'9" in height, to be properly secured in a front booster seat system in the rear seat, granted a rear seat is available. - TRANSPORTATION GENERAL : **Public-Private Transportation Act of 2016.** Enacts the "Public-Private Transportation Act of 2016." Sets forth the guidelines for how a public entity may enter into a public-private initiative in regards to a qualifying transportation facility. Requires the private entity to obtain a certificate from the public entity before development or operation and to have its proposals reviewed by the fiscal review committee of the general assembly. Provides that a request for a certificate must include a topographic map, a description of the facility, projected cost, a list of permits and approvals, the facilities plans, and a list of public utility facilities. Provides additional guidelines for the development and operation of a public transportation entity.
SB2093 - B. Ketron (R) - 04/04/16 - Senate passed with amendment 2.
Amendment: SENATE AMENDMENT 2 (014950) deletes and rewrites the bill such that the substantive changes are as follows: (1) redefines transportation facility to exclude highways, bridges, tunnels, and overpasses; (2) requires a statement of the risks, liabilities,

and responsibilities to be transferred or assigned to the private entity for development, redevelopment, or operation of the transportation facility including revenue risk and any operation and maintenance; (3) authorizes a public entity to grant approval if it determines that the proposed development, redevelopment, or operation of the transportation facility serves the public interest; (4) requires the public entity to require the private entity to pay for cost for an independent audit of any and all cost estimates associated with the private entity's proposed development, redevelopment, or operation for any project with an estimated cost exceeding \$50,000,000; (5) requires any project or qualifying transportation facility for which TDOT is the responsible public entity and for which toll revenue is collected, to be included the Department's transportation improvement program submitted to the General Assembly for approval; (6) requires the public entity to submit a plan of financing to the Comptroller of the Treasury (COT) for any action authorizing grants, milestone payments, or loans prior to adoption of such grants, payments or loans; (7) authorizes the COT to request additional information to review the proposed plan of financing; (8) requires the evaluation of each plan of financing to be based on the plan's circumstances and only approved if such plan is in the public's interest; (9) requires the private entity to notify the existing transportation facility of its request for approval within 15 days of the private party submitting its request for approval by furnishing a written notice to the registered agent of the existing transportation facility on file with the Secretary of State with required information if the proposed development, redevelopment, or operation of the transportation facility will utilize, connect to, interconnect with, or cross over the private property on which an existing transportation facility is located; and (10) authorizes the existing transportation facility to submit comments to the proposed development, redevelopment, or operation of the transportation facility to the public entity within 30 days after receiving such written notice.

Beginning September 1, 2016, requires the informational video to be viewed by all first-time applicants for a driver license or intermediate driver license.

M. Littleton (R) **TRANSPORTATION GENERAL : Maintenance of roads in state parks.** Requires the department of transportation to be responsible for the maintenance all roads in state parks, whether county or state roads. Broadly captioned.
SB1754 - P. Bailey (R) - 03/07/16 - Taken off notice in Senate Transportation & Safety Committee.
Fiscal Note: (Dated March 2, 2016) Increase State Expenditures - \$50,000/Highway Fund Decrease Local Expenditures - \$50,000
6. HB1564
M. Carter (R) **TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES : Certification program for manufacturers of autonomous vehicles.** Establishes certification program through department of safety for manufacturers of autonomous vehicles before such vehicles may be tested, operated, sold or leased in this state. Also requires a fleet service provider to be certified by the department of safety in order for the provider to operate autonomous vehicles on the streets and highways of this state. Creates a per mile tax structure for autonomous vehicles.
SB1561 - M. Green (R) - 04/13/16 - Senate passed with previously adopted amendments 1 & 2.
Amendment: Senate Amendment 1 (013378) defines "autonomous technology" to mean technology installed on a motor vehicle that has the capability to drive the vehicle on which the technology is installed in high or full automation mode, without any supervision by a human operator, with specific driving mode performance by the automated driving system of all aspects of the dynamic driving task that can be managed by a human driver, including the ability to automatically bring the motor vehicle into a minimal risk condition in the event of a critical vehicle or system failure or other emergency event. Defines terms to include various driving scenarios in which autonomous technology controls a vehicle. SENATE AMENDMENT 2 (014402) amends Tenn. Code Ann. § 55-9-105(c), as amended by Public Acts of 2016 (Senate Bill 2333 / House Bill 2173), by deleting subdivision (6)(B) that references Tenn.Code Ann. § 55-8-202 and substituting instead a definition of "autonomous technology" to mean technology installed on a motor vehicle that has the capability to drive the motor vehicle without the active physical control or monitoring by a human operator.

SB1589 - E. Jackson (R) - 04/19/16 - Senate passed with previously adopted amendment 2.
Amendment: House amendment 1 (013293) deletes and rewrites the bill such that the only substantive changes are: (1) to specify that the amount of points added to a driver's record for a violation shall equal the number assessed for careless or negligent driving and (2) to require that offenders attend a driver education course. SENATE AMENDMENT 2 (015220) removes the provisions of this bill and House Amendment 1 concerning the assessment of points for texting while driving. Unlike present law, this amendment will not specifically prohibit the assessment of points for texting while driving.

Specifies that permit is valid for ten calendar days for each trip. Restricts interstate travel on weekdays in Shelby, Davidson, Hamilton, and Knox counties.
SB1479 - P. Bailey (R) - 03/23/16 - Senate passed with amendment 1.
Amendment: Senate amendment 1 (013045) deletes all language of the original bill. Establishes that fees for granting special permits for moving vehicles of excessive widths shall be: \$20 for excessive widths of 14 feet or under, instead of the current fees of \$10 for excessive widths of 10 feet or under; \$15 for excessive widths of over 10 feet but not more than 12 feet, and \$25 for excessive widths of over 12 feet but not more than 14 feet; \$30 for excessive widths of over 14 feet but not more than 16 feet, the same fee as established under current law; \$30 for excessive widths of over 16 feet, plus \$5 for each additional foot or fraction thereof greater than 16 feet, rather than 17 feet as established under current law; and \$2,500 for houseboats with excess width of over 17 feet plus an additional \$100 fee for each additional inch or fraction thereof greater than 17 feet, rather than 18 feet as established under current law. Increases from \$15 to \$20 the fee for excessive height or length. Requires special permits issued for overweight or overdimensional motor vehicles to allow for continuous movement 24 hours a day, seven days a week, including legal holidays as listed, with certain exceptions. Prohibits interstate travel between 6:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. in counties exceeding 250,000 in population. Authorizes the Commissioner of the Department of Transportation (TDOT) to restrict time of movement for vehicles over 165,000 pounds, 15 feet 6 inches in height or 16 feet in width, based on traffic volume and road conditions. Establishes that permits will be valid for 10 calendar days for each single trip.
Fiscal Note: (Dated January 25, 2016) Decrease State Revenue – Exceeds \$66,300/Recurring/Highway Fund Increase State Expenditures - \$6,000/One-Time/Highway Fund
9. HB2530
M. Stewart (D) TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES : **Driving on suspended license - community service in lieu of fines.** Allows a county or city by resolution or ordinance to establish programs allowing indigent persons who have been convicted of driving while their license is suspended or revoked to complete community service in lieu of paying the fine or costs for the conviction. Broadly captioned.
SB2149 - R. Tate (D) - 04/21/16 - Senate passed with amendment 1.
Amendment: Senate amendment 1 (015117) adds clarifying language to the bill.
10. HB1962
K. Camper (D) TAXES BUSINESS : **Franchise and excise tax credit for certain shippers.** Creates a credit against the franchise and excise tax liability of a shipper that establishes a turn-around policy as described below. Requires credit to be equal to two percent of qualified transportation expenditures. Defines "shipper" as a person that enters into a contract for transportation services with a motor carrier. Clarifies that in order to qualify for the credit, the shipper must establish a uniform and internal turn-around policy for assuring that pickups and deliveries are performed during the period of time agreed upon by a motor carrier and a shipper and for preventing delays in the timely transportation of goods over the public highways. Requires policy to include certain minimum requirements, such as that pickups and deliveries will be accomplished on the date scheduled for pickup or delivery, that pickups must be completed within the period of time agreed to by the shipper and the motor carrier, which period must not exceed two hours, and that deliveries must be completed within the period of time agreed to by the shipper and the motor carrier, which period must not exceed two hours. Requires applicant for the credit to submit a copy of the turn-around policy with the commissioner of revenue. Authorizes the commissioner to conduct audits or require the filing of additional information necessary to substantiate or adjust the amount of the credit allowed by this bill, and to determine that the shipper has complied with all statutory requirements so as to be entitled to the credit. The credit will only be available upon a determination by the commissioner, with approval by the commissioner of economic and community development, that the qualified transportation expenditures and the credit are in the best interests of the state. Prohibits total credit claimed for any taxable year, including the amount of any carryforward credit claimed, from exceeding 50 percent of the combined franchise and excise tax liability shown by the return before any credit is taken. Clarifies that any unused credit may be carried forward in any tax period until the credit is taken, but the credit may not be carried forward for more than 15 years.
SB2587 - M. Norris (R) - 03/22/16 - Taken off notice in Senate Finance Revenue Subcommittee.
11. HB1970
K. Camper (D) TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES : **Paying of certain installment plans.** Requires that for any person with outstanding traffic fines and costs exceeding \$200 and that are older than four years, the person is eligible to pay the fines and costs on an installment plan. Prohibits the person's driver license from being suspended so long as payments are made.
SB2170 - R. Tate (D) - 01/25/16 - Referred to Senate Transportation & Safety Committee.
12. HB1301
M. Sparks (R) TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES : **Certain maximum fee for towing.** Establishes a maximum fee of \$20.00 for towing firms to charge to release a motor vehicle attached for towing, but not yet transported to another location, when the motor vehicle is parked without authority on private property. Establishes a Class C misdemeanor for a violation.
SB1093 - L. Harris (D) - 02/19/15 - Referred to Senate Transportation & Safety Committee.
Fiscal Note: (Dated March 19, 2015) NOT SIGNIFICANT
13. HB2607
M. Sparks (R) TRANSPORTATION GENERAL : **Operation of drones.** Directs the commissioner of transportation, in consultation with the commissioner of safety, to petition the federal aviation administration for a certificate of authority to operate unmanned aerial systems within the navigable airspace of each of the grand divisions of the state. Prohibits a political subdivision from banning the use of an unmanned aerial system within the jurisdictional boundaries of the political subdivision if the unmanned aerial system complies with all state and federal laws and regulations. Requires a student who provides evidence of completion of a college-level course or any accredited training program in which the student received training related to the launching, operating, and landing of unmanned aerial systems to receive high school credit towards graduation for such training. Specifies that credit for the training may be substituted for the required credit in computer education or for credit in two elective courses.
SB2634 - M. Green (R) - 04/04/16 - Senate passed with amendment 1.
Amendment: Senate amendment 1, House Transportation Committee amendment 1 (013732) deletes all language of the original bill. Authorizes a high school student who completed a college-level course or other accredited training program related to unmanned aerial systems to receive credit towards graduation. Requires the State Board of Education to approve appropriate courses for which credit for the training may be substituted.
Fiscal Note: (Dated February 21, 2016) Increase State Expenditures – Exceeds \$500,000/Highway Fund
14. HB2477
K. Dunlap (D) ENVIRONMENT & NATURE : **Requires the Great Falls Dam to be reopened.** Requires the Great Falls Dam between White and Warren counties to be reopened.
SB2523 - J. Bowling (R) - 04/18/16 - Senate passed with amendment 1.
Amendment: Senate Amendment 1 (014550) rewrites the bill and urges, rather than requires, the TVA to reopen the Great Falls Dam Bridge connecting White County and Warren County for thoroughfare traffic.

Fiscal Note: (Dated February 1, 2016) Other Fiscal Impact – This bill will not result in any fiscal impact to state or local government. However, there could be a one-time increase in federal expenditures to fund the costs associated with any required bridge repair. The extent and timing for any such expenditure is unknown.

Defines "essential services" to mean the initial issuance of driver licenses, learner permits, handgun carry permits, photo identification licenses, and other state-issued forms of identification that may be used for voting purposes.

16. HB2017
B. Beck (D) **JUDICIARY : Revokes driver license for delinquent taxes and fees.** Deletes requirement for driver license revocation unless all delinquent litigation taxes, court costs, and fines imposed as a result of disposition of a criminal offense are paid. Requires driver license revocation only if licensee has paid no portion of delinquent litigation taxes, court costs, and fines. Allows reinstatement of the revoked license if the person commences repayment of the delinquent litigation taxes, court costs, and fines. Removes authorization for a hardship exception or payment plan.
SB1954 - J. Yarbro (D) - 01/25/16 - Referred to Senate Transportation & Safety Committee.
17. HB770
J. Armstrong (D) **EDUCATION : Requiring restraint systems on school buses.** Requires any bus ordered or purchased on or after July 1, 2016, to be equipped with a restraint system that is approved by the national transportation and safety board for the driver and all passengers. Requires any bus that is currently used to transport students be equipped with a restraint system by July 1, 2023.
SB954 - L. Harris (D) - 03/23/16 - Taken off notice in Senate Education Committee.
Fiscal Note: (Dated March 10, 2015) Increase State Expenditures – \$5,530,800/BEP/Each Year FY16-17 through FY24-25 Increase Local Expenditures – \$33,185,000/Each Year FY15-16 to FY22-23*
18. HB2510
A. Holt (R) **TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES : Display of headlights on mountain highways.** Requires headlights to be displayed on motor vehicle while approaching a curve on a mountain highway where the view is obstructed. Broadly captioned.
SB2492 - P. Bailey (R) - 03/24/16 - Senate passed with amendment 1.
Amendment: Senate amendment 1 (014017) deletes all language of the original bill. Requires all red-light related citations issued based on evidence from an unmanned electronic traffic enforcement camera to state the following: "Non-payment of this citation cannot adversely affect your credit score or report, driver's license, and/or automobile insurance rates."
Fiscal Note: (Dated March 2, 2016) NOT SIGNIFICANT
19. HB1464
J. Zachary (R) **TRANSPORTATION GENERAL : Allocation of surplus revenues to the priority transportation project.** Provides that in any month in which surplus state tax revenue exceeds \$5 million, 25 percent of the surplus tax revenue for that month shall be deposited in a newly created priority transportation project fund to be used solely for "essential transportation projects." Requires the commissioner of transportation to submit to the general assembly a priority project list, ranking the essential transportation projects that the commissioner recommends to be funded from the priority transportation project fund. Authorizes the general assembly to fund recommendations from the commissioner's priority list from the project fund. Broadly captioned.
SB1807 - F. Niceley (R) - 04/18/16 - Taken off notice in Senate Finance, Ways & Means Committee.
Amendment: House Transportation Committee amendment 1 (013987) deletes and replaces language of the bill such that the substantive changes are to: (1) sunsets the act on July 1, 2021; (2) require the Commissioner of TDOT to recommend the top 100 projects to be funded prior to March 1, 2017, for FY17-18, rather than prior to March 1, 2016, for FY15-16 and FY16-17; (3) redefines an "essential transportation project" to include any unfunded phase of transportation infrastructure project commitment made prior to July 1, 2016, rather than July 1, 2015; (4) require that designated surplus state tax revenue for the Priority Transportation Project Fund (PTPF) be released and deposited into the PTPF at the close of any fiscal year, rather than monthly; and (5) require, if the estimate of surplus state tax revenue differs from the budgeted estimated state tax revenue, then an amount equal to the percentage by which the surplus state tax revenue does not meet the monthly estimate based on the budgeted estimated state tax revenue, to be transferred from the PTPF to the General Fund for reallocation. J. Sexton (R) **TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES : Vehicle registration discount for persons 65 or older.** Grants a 50 percent discount on the vehicle registration fee for persons 65 or older, which is applicable at the time of renewal of registration.
SB2230 - S. Southerland (R) - 03/14/16 - Senate Transportation & Safety Committee deferred to 03/21/16.
Fiscal Note: (Dated March 3, 2016) Decrease State Revenue – \$157,200/General Fund \$7,700,700/Highway Fund
21. HB1711
E. Smith (R) **TRANSPORTATION GENERAL : Standards for electric bicycles.** Establishes classifications of electric bicycles and clarifies that an electric bicycle is not subject to any requirements or laws applicable to motor vehicles. On or after January 1, 2017, requires every manufacturer or distributor of new electric bicycles to affix a label to the bicycle that contains the classification number, top-assisted speed, and motor wattage of the bicycle. Prohibits an electric bicycle from being sold that does not have such label affixed to the bicycle. Creates a Class C misdemeanor offense of a person knowingly modifying an electric bicycle so as to change the speed capability and not appropriately replace the required label. Prohibits and electric bicycle from operating on any street or highway unless the bicycle complies with applicable equipment and manufacturing requirements established by state and federal law and is equipped in such a manner that the electric motor is disengaged or ceases to function when the brakes are applied or when a switch is activated or released.
SB1705 - R. Briggs (R) - 03/23/16 - Senate passed with amendment 1.
Amendment: Senate amendment 1 (013699) deletes and rewrites the bill such that the only substantive change is to add language that prohibits electric bicycles from being operated on sidewalks, unless the use of bicycles on sidewalks is authorized by resolution, ordinance, or rule by a local government or by rule or policy of a state agency having jurisdiction over that sidewalk and the electric

motor is disabled.

Fiscal Note: (Dated February 25, 2016) NOT SIGNIFICANT

22. HB1522
J. Matlock (R) TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES : **Registration of trailers.** Deletes various provisions that distinguish different types of trailers, such as privately owned trailers and house trailers. Imposes the registration tax on all trailers, and changes the amount of the registration tax to the following: (1) \$25.00 on trailers with one axle; (2) \$35.00 on trailers with two axles; and (3) \$45.00 on trailers with three or more axles. Redefines "trailer" to include pole trailers and semitrailers. Authorizes county clerks to collect an additional fee of \$1.00 for each initial issuance of registration and registration plates for trailers.

Requires an application for such license be submitted to the Secretary of State along with a fee. Requires such operators to limit individual player deposits to no more than \$2,500 per month unless the player provides reasonable certification or proof that such limit should be increased. Requires operators to protect player funds on deposit. Requires players to be limited to one active and continuously used account. Requires operators to submit annual reports to the Secretary of State (SOS) regarding revenue, opened accounts, and winnings issued. Requires the SOS to oversee licensure of operators and maintain a registry of licensed operators; to investigate alleged violations by operators; and to issue subpoenas and deny, suspend, or revoke licenses as necessary. Requires in addition to the application fee, a licensure fee, an annual renewal fee, late fees, a correction of information fee, and a change of information fee. SENATE AMENDMENT 4 (015072) requires that all licensed fantasy sports operators contract annually with a third party to perform an independent audit, consistent with the attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, to ensure compliance with this part. Stipulates that audit report shall be submitted to the secretary of state for examination and inspection. Requires records to be confidential and not be open to public inspection. HOUSE AMENDMENT 2 (015901) imposes a tax at a 6 percent rate on all adjusted revenues of a fantasy sports contest offered by a fantasy sport operator to Tennessee consumers. Requires the commissioner to collect the taxes. Requires taxes be due and payable quarterly. Directs 60 percent of the taxes from July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017 to be allocated to the general fund. Increases to 68 percent beginning July 1, 2017. Requires 20 percent be allocated among the counties of the state in the proportion that the population of each bears to the aggregate population of the state according to the most recent federal census and other census authorized by law. Requires 10 percent be allocated to the fantasy sports fund established by 47-18-5607. Directs 10 percent to the department of revenue for administration starting July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017. Decreases to 2 percent July 1, 2017. Creates a fund to be known as the "fantasy sports fund". Requires all fees and penalties collected and 10 percent of the tax levied pursuant to the Fantasy Sports Act be deposited in the fantasy sports fund. Empowers the secretary of state to administer the fund. Requires all costs the secretary of state associated with the administration of this be paid from the fund. Requires 10 percent of left over funds in the fantasy fund at the end of any fiscal year be reverted to the general fund.

Prohibits employers from prohibiting, discharging, or discriminating against employees who inquire about, discuss, or otherwise disclose wages of the employee or another employee. Establishes liability to employers to additionally be liable for any compensatory or punitive damages deemed appropriate with except for the United States or this state and its political subdivisions. Authorizes the economic council on women to conduct research regarding wage disparities between sexes. Authorizes the council to provide training to commission employees and affected individuals on matters involving wage discrimination and to train women and girls in developing negotiation skills. The council will report to the commissioner, the governor, and the speakers of the general assembly regarding aforementioned research and training.

Specifies that "short-term rental unit" (1) Means a residential dwelling of any type, including, but not limited to, a single-family residence, apartment, condominium, or cooperative unit, in which a person can obtain, for consideration, sleeping accommodations for less than 30 consecutive days; (2) Includes vacation lodging as defined by TCA 67-4-702 and property used to provide hospitality services as defined by TCA 68-120-101(i); and (3) Does not include a bed and breakfast establishment or bed and breakfast homestay, as defined by TCA 68-14-502(1), a hotel, or a time-share program.

R. Tate (D) **COMMERCIAL LAW : Approval of transfer of structured settlement payment rights.** Requires an application for approval of a transfer of structured settlement payments rights to be made by the transferee. Permits application to be brought in the county in which the payee resides, where the obligor or annuity insurer has its principal place of business, or in the court or before the administrative authority that approved the structured settlement agreement.
HB586 - J. Coley (R) - 03/30/16 - House passed.
Amendment: Senate amendment 1 (014148) establishes that the circuit court shall have nonexclusive jurisdiction over any approval of a transfer of structured settlement payment rights. Authorizes any interested party to a structured settlement to request a hearing and requires the respective court to conduct a hearing within 60 days from such request. Requires the payee to appear in person, unless the court determines upon the motion of an interested party that good cause exists to excuse the payee from the hearing.

M. Norris (R) **PROFESSIONS & LICENSURE : Revises requirements for certain professionals.** Revises various provisions regarding cemetery owners and companies, architects, insurers, shops licensed by the board of cosmetology and barber examiners, funeral directors, real estate firms, real estate brokers, affiliate brokers, time-share salespersons, and acquisition agents, as follows: (1) Present law authorizes a cemetery owner to charge an administrative or documentation fee of up to \$100 to any noncemetery personnel seeking to install a commodity or to have a commodity installed by the cemetery company. The fee charged has to be the same amount charged

to all cemetery customers, including those customers who purchase the commodity from the cemetery company charging the fee. The cemetery owners may not charge any other fees related to any noncemetery personnel seeking to install a commodity, other than the administrative or documentation fee, installation, and memorial care. Revises the above provision to clarify that a cemetery owner may charge an administrative, processing, or documentation fee of up to \$100 per agreement or transaction, including, but not limited to, allowing noncemetery personnel to install or have installed a commodity or monument. (2) This bill requires any cemetery company that sells funeral merchandise to maintain a price list for that funeral merchandise, which will be provided to any person who inquires about funeral merchandise or the price of such merchandise. (3) Present law authorizes the commissioner of commerce and insurance to promulgate, by rule, a convenience fee to cover the costs of issuing or renewing licenses, registrations, and permits via the Internet. Any fee set by rule under the authority of this section may be assessed in addition to the fee or fees assessed for the costs of issuing or renewing licenses, registrations, and permits by mail or in person. The fee may not exceed the actual costs incurred in issuing or renewing a license, registration, or permit on the Internet. This bill revises this provision to authorize the commissioner to establish such a convenience fee regardless of the method of issuance or renewal (via Internet or otherwise). (4) Present law authorizes the state board of examiners for architects and engineers to issue a certificate of registration as an architect, engineer, registered interior designer, or landscape architect to any person who holds a like unexpired certificate of qualification or registration issued to the person by any state, territory, or possession of the United States or of any country, if the applicant's qualifications meet the requirements of this state's laws and the rules established by the board. This bill adds authorization for the board to issue a certificate of registration as an architect to any person whose qualifications do not meet the requirements of this state or the rules established by the board if that person: holds a like unexpired certificate of qualification or registration issued to such person by any state, territory, or possession of the United States or by any country; holds an unexpired national certificate issued by the national council of architectural registration boards; and presents proof of the certificates upon application to the board. The issuance of a certificate of registration pursuant to this provision will be at the sole discretion of the board's determination that the applicant has qualifications suitable to be issued a certificate of registration in this state. (5) Under present law, it is unlawful to operate a barber shop or barber styling shop unless it is, at all times, under the direct supervision and management of a master barber. Also, present law requires each cosmetology shop to have a managing cosmetologist who is at least 18 years of age; each manicure shop to have a managing manicurist who is at least 18 years of age; and each skin care shop to have a managing aesthetician who is at least 18 years of age. This bill rewrites these provisions and instead requires that each shop licensed by the board of cosmetology and barber examiners designate a manager. The shop must submit the name and license information of its manager upon application and renewal. Under this bill, it will be unlawful to operate a shop unless it is, at all times, under the direction of a manager or designated manager. While on duty, the manager or designated manager will be responsible for the shop's compliance with state law and rules of the board. The board may require the name of the shop's manager or designated manager to be posted in such form and location as the board may prescribe. Specifies that the manager and designated manager may manage those who practice disciplines in cosmetology or barbering other than the discipline in which the manager or designated manager is licensed; however, the manager or designated manager may only practice within the field that the person is licensed. Defines "designated manager" as a barber or cosmetologist licensed in at least one discipline that a shop is licensed to offer who serves in a supervisory or managerial capacity of the shop in the absence of the manager. Present law defines "manager" as a managing cosmetologist, managing manicurist or managing aesthetician. This bill redefines "manager" as a barber or cosmetologist licensed in at least one discipline that a shop is licensed to offer who serves in a supervisory or managerial capacity in the shop whose information is filed with the board. (6) This bill clarifies that even if a cosmetology shop passes the required inspection for initial issuance of a license or relocation, the application may still be denied if other requirements of law or rule are not met. (7) Generally under present law, an applicant for licensure as a funeral director must submit proof of completion of two years of apprenticeship in the presence of and under the direction and supervision of a licensed funeral director. This bill adds that an associate's degree from a college accredited by the American board of funeral service education may be substituted for one year of apprenticeship. (8) Under present law, upon written request accompanied by the license and the fee for change of status, any real estate firm, real estate broker, affiliate broker, time-share salesperson, or acquisition agent may temporarily retire the license. Present law provides that temporary retirement will not be permitted unless all educational requirements of present law have been completed; this bill removes this provision. (9) Under present law, upon written request accompanied by the broker's or affiliate broker's license, the proper form and the change of status fee, any real estate broker or affiliate broker who is ineligible for temporary retirement may be placed in inactive status. This bill removes this provision for inactive status, and provides that any license in active status on this bill's effective date (July 1, 2016) will be transferred to retirement status. Under present law, a licensee wishing to reactivate a license from an inactive or retirement status must submit the proper form and pay the fee for a change of status. This bill removes the reference to inactive status from this provision, and this bill prohibits the reactivation of a temporarily retired license until the licensee provides proof of completion of 16 classroom hours in real estate courses during the current license renewal period. Under present law, any law or rule or regulation that has the effect of prohibiting reinstatement or reactivation of a license upon the payment of the applicable fees and penalties does not apply to any person who has retired the person's license or who has been placed in inactive status if the following conditions are applicable: (1) The person's license was revoked, suspended, or downgraded while the license was retired or in inactive status merely because the educational requirements were not completed within the required time; (2) The educational requirements were completed within two years from the date the license was retired or placed in inactive status and all additional educational requirements, if any, have been met; and (3) The reinstatement fees and penalties are paid. Under present law, if all of the above conditions are met, the license of the person is reactivated. This bill deletes these provisions for reactivation (10 pp.).

HB2569 - G. McCormick (R) - 04/07/16 - House passed.

Amendment: Senate Amendment 1 (012809) adds language to the original bill that (1) increases the price per square foot by \$0.03, from \$0.23 to \$0.26, that a cemetery owner may charge a lot owner in a cemetery for installation of a commodity; (2) prohibits the installation of the commodity by noncemetery personnel; and (3) states that if the price exceeds \$0.26 per square foot, the lot owner may utilize noncemetery personnel for installation of the commodity.

Requires each organization claiming to be exempt from the registration requirements of a charitable organization to file its exemption form with the secretary of state on or before the first day of the fourth month following the close of the organization's fiscal year, as opposed to within six months of closing. Permits this form to be filed at the same time as the organization's annual report.

24. SB1930 ENTERTAINMENT : **Enacts "Fans Anti-Counterfeit Ticket (FACT) Act."** Enacts the "Fans Anti-Counterfeit Ticket (FACT) Act," which requires the registration of ticket brokers with the department of commerce and insurance within 180 days of the effective date of this act or within 30 days of commencing business in this state as a ticket broker. Prohibits a person from registering as a ticket broker who has been convicted of a felony that the commissioner finds reflects unfavorably on the fitness of the person to register. Requires certain disclosures by ticket brokers, including the face value and exact location of the seat of any ticket offered for sale. Adds requirements and prohibitions with regard to the resale of tickets.
